I am Gordon Ainsleigh, 20-year Board Member of Auburn Recreation District. It has been my fortune, debatably good or bad, to have been president of two boards of directors at a time of crisis.

One was with Midway Heights County Water District in the late 1980s, when the EPA chose us as the first-in-the-nation community water district to attack, and force into chlorination. So in spite of the fact that the head of the National Cancer Institute had recently bragged about the new science showing that chlorinated water caused bowel and bladder cancer, and in spite of our Board's stance that we wanted to pursue ozonization for clean water, the Court went with the statement of the California State Health Officer that chlorinated water did not cause cancer, and we were forced to comply, trading the present giardia risk for a future bowel and bladder cancer risk. Our two small victories were that the EPA started with a proposed \$500,000 fine, and we maneuvered them down to \$37,500, and that we found a way to get the chlorinated water lines installed for less than half of the government-recommended approach, on a time-payment plan that was easy for our customers. It was a tempestuous time. I had taken the Presidency when the hall was full of angry customers, our past president was being unjustly prosecuted, and no one else was willing to sit behind the microphone. I changed the way meetings were handled, and two months later we had a peaceful nearly-empty hall, and could get on with business.

When I got elected to ARD, our organization was the least-trusted and most criticized special district in the Auburn Area. I was the only one who saw what the problem was. ARD had gone through 4 nightmare District Administrators in 10 years. All were wizards at resumes and interviews, but were either inept or dishonest, or both, at managing our recreation district. I also saw what no one else saw: that Placer High School District and Sierra College had also prospered as long as they hired people from within who had proven they were trustworthy and talented; but when they did a national search to get THE BEST, disaster struck. Sierra College paid out \$600,000 to a female librarian who had been bullied by their new wonder administrator, and Placer High School District had to pass a \$23,000,000 local bond to pay for the new high school in Foresthill, because their wonder administrator had deliberately not applied for 1994 State School Bond money that would have built Foresthill High School. Why? Because Mr Wonderful needed passage of a local bond in his resume to get the top job at wealthy Acalanes HSD, which pays twice as much as Placer HSD, and require superintendents with a proven record of bond passage, who can persuade their wealthy citizens in Orinda and Moraga and Lafayette to pass the many bonds and parcel taxes that support their elite school system. I saw that we had to hire from within, and that we had a bright, hard-working, honest young man with a degree in Recreation Management from Northern Colorado University named Kahl Muscott who could save us from disaster. For two month in a row, the rest of the ARD Board ridiculed me because Kahl didn't have the experience. Finally, I got together with the consultant who was doing the nationwide search, and we came up with a plan: hire the new Wonder Administrator for 6 months to teach Kahl how to do the job. Our new wonder administrator was so good that he left after 3 months to build a park from the ground up at decommissioned El Toro Marine Airbase, but Kahl knew enough by then to carry on. And ARD is now a model of success among special districts.

It seems likely that LAFCO could use a person like me on the Board, to see the problems that others don't see, and to formulate solutions that others don't comprehend. Position: Secretary/Treasurer - CARCD

I am the CARCD Nominating Committee designate for the position of Secretary/Treasurer for CARCD. I have held this position for the last three years. Prior to that I was the CARCD Vice-President for one year before moving into the Secretary/Treasurer position upon a mid-term vacancy in that position and on election by the CARCD Board of Directors. I was the Regional Chair for the Central Sierra Region for four years before being elected to the Vice-President position. I have been a Director on the Tahoe RCD for nine years a currently serve as its Treasurer.

While serving for eight years on the Board of Directors for CARCD and four years on the Executive Committee I have been actively involved in many aspects of the Association. I currently serve on the Revolving Loan Committee, the Legislative Committee and the Bylaws Committee. In my role as the CARCD treasurer I assumed a very active role between the time Emily Sutherland (our former Office Manager) and when we hired our current Financial and Administrative Manager. This involved doing all the CARCD banking and issuing checks to pay our invoices. We moved most of our banking to a new institution which provides more flexibility to all CARCD to process our revenue and expenditures and spreads-out our financial exposure. Under my direction we currently have an application pending with this new institution for a line-of-credit to help CARCD be more timely in its payments to RCDs, a situation that surfaced due to the significant increase in grant funds that CARCD has acquired for pass-through to RCDs. Additionally, for the last six years I am one of two Board of Directors that, along with our Executive Director, meets regularly with the Director of the CA Department of Conservation and senior staff to maintain and improve our collaborative relationship.

In addition to my role on the CARCD Board of Directors, I have been the treasurer for two not-for-profit organizations for the past nine years. One provides environmental education about the Lake Tahoe watershed to elementary through college students and the other provided an educational exchange program for US and Russian college students between Lake Tahoe and Lake Baikal in Russia. This second program has been suspended due to the political difficulty in operating this type of NGO program in Russia.

In 2012 I retired from a position I held for 23 years as the Executive Officer for a CA State agency. This was an at-will position reporting to a nine-member board appointed by the Governor. I oversaw the work of approximately 75 staff. At the time I was the Central Sierra Regional Chair the six regional Chairs were active voting members in all aspects of the CARCD's decision making. I am extremely disappointed that under the current/previous CARCD leadership that is no longer the case.

I was born and mostly raised in Seaside, California. My parents are from farm families in Mississippi. We currently have relatives farming in California, Mississippi, Michigan and Texas. Coincidentally numerous of those family members serve on their local Soil (and Water) Conservation District Boards. Two of my daughters are involved professionally in sustainability issues here in California. I was born on a US Army base, started grade school on the Monterey peninsula. My family spent time in Washington, Georgia, New Jersey and Hawaii, but the Army in it's infinite wisdom and great organizational skills transferred us back to the Monterey peninsula where I was able to spend 11th grade and graduate high school with some of the same kids I started kindergarten thru 2cnd grade with! North Fork Phase II: Contract was executed on 3/15/24. Work began near Gillis Hill Rd and Yankee Jims Rd on March 18th. Timbersmith and subcontractors Highlanders and White Oak Jack implementing hand cut, pile, and burn concurrently. Approximately 40 acres burned in Zone 1 and approximately 60 acres cut and piled in Zone 1. Zone 1 will be fully cut and piled by end of week of 3/25/24. Mastication will commence in Zone 2 in week of 3/25/24. Spring weather conditions have been favorable for burning, allowing 200+ piles to be ignited on Wednesday 3/20/24. Somewhere between 500-750 piles burned in the first week. Work is being completed with approximately 30 Highlanders laborers, plus 5-10 crew leads supplied by Timbersmith and White Oak Jack.

Cordi

- This prescribed fire season (since October 2023), Placer PBA has completed 39 acres of broadcast burning in 10 burns; otherwise, this season has been consistently wet/rainy and has not been conducive for good prescribed fire. These demonstration burns trained 88 community members.
- Chris and Cordi developed Fuels and Fire Behavior course. Being offered Thursday evenings (March 14th and 21st) and Saturday, March 23rd. Overall 36 people are registered for this course.

- Hosted Rx Fire 101 Workshop on November 11 (9 participants) and December 2, 2023 (12 participants). Will be hosting another on April 6th (so far, 27 registered).
- Chris and Cordi have been presenting at the Sierra Nevada Rancher's Fire Academy in collaboration with the UC Cooperative Extension. Guest presentations have been on Thursday evenings and covered topics like liability, permitting, weather, and fuels.
- Placer PBA hosted 4 PBA Coffee Chats: monthly meetups for community members to get together and ask questions about burns plans, talk about lessons learned, and get to know each other.

- Received three small grants to support Rx Burning program since January 1, 2024:
 - \$10,000: CAL FIRE Forest Stewardship to support supplies purchases for local Fire Safe Councils to increase rx burning through their communities.
 - \$50,000: CAL FIRE Wildfire Resilience Stewardship Grant; also to support supplies purchases, technical assistance for local Fire Safe Councils.
 - \$40,000: Fire Adapted Community (FAC) Network: to increase outreach, social media platforms, and education for prescribed fire in Placer County.

Allison

- Mentorship Program hosted a dinner with students and professionals at Redwood Region Logging conference on 3/15. 40-50 people attended – great networking opportunity!
- Mosquito working to get archaeologist and RPF under contract. Continued outreach and coordination with landowners. Hosted first EFRT meeting with local federal, County, state and other agency stakeholders. Planted 36 acres within the fire footprint.
- PCCF continued pile burning, though it's been slow lately due to unavailability of the Jesuit retreat center.

Lewis

- Pile burning and maintenance continue on North Fork Phase 1b
- Coordinating with CAL FIRE on several smaller projects under the unit support services grant
- Preparing to take the RPF exam in early April. CARCD Workforce Development Grant providing funds for some study hours and prep courses.
