

WHO WE ARE

The mission of the Forestry and Natural Resources Career Mentorship Program is to increase recruitment and retention of early-career forestry professionals by: pairing university and community college students with a professional mentor, providing networking and training opportunities, and offering insight into a forestry career.

The Program recognizes that a diverse and expanded workforce is essential to addressing current and future challenges facing the field. We encourage support for underrepresented groups in the profession, including women, Black, Indigenous, Latinx, Asian, Pacific Islander, and LGBTQIA+ by: providing training on Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Justice (DEIJ) for participants, pairing participants based on shared professional interests and identity (when requested), and highlighting the diversity of identities and specialties that exist within the field of forestry.

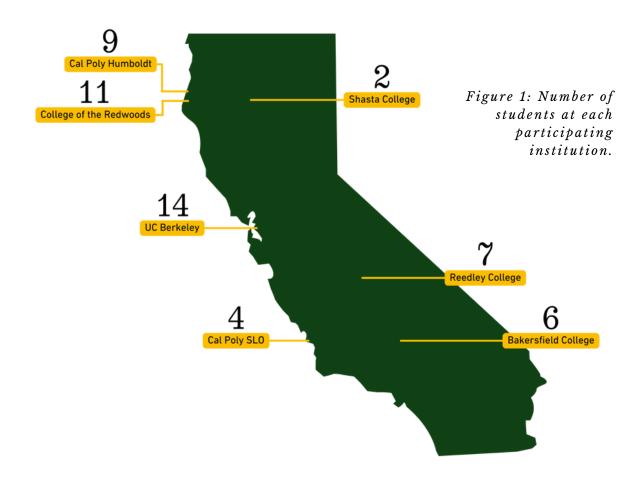


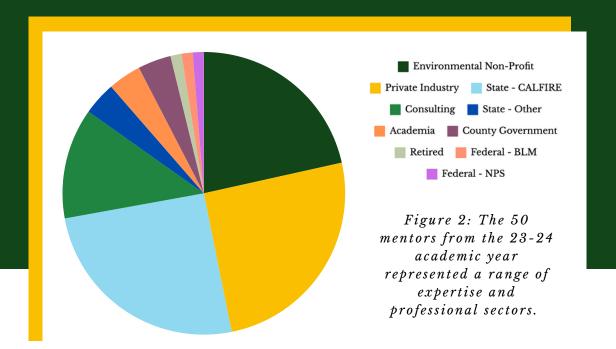




OVERVIEW

In the 23-24 academic year, the Program served <u>53</u> students from <u>7 community colleges and universities</u> throughout California (Figure 1). These students were mentored by <u>50 mentors</u> from various forestry and natural resource related sectors (Figure 2).

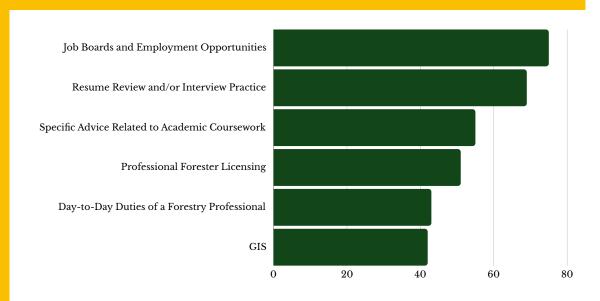


Figure 3: During the 23-24 end of year survey, mentors and mentees were asked what topics of discussion they engaged in, and were given a list of options, with the six most common topics shown here

77% of pairs met once per month or more, and used their time to discuss job boards and employment opportunities (76%), day-to-day duties of a forestry professional (69%), professional forestry licensing (55%), resume review and interview practice (43%) and more (Figure 3).

PROGRAMMING

The Forestry and Natural Resources Career Mentorship Program provided 13 unique opportunities for mentors and mentees to meet, expand their understanding of forestry and natural resources careers, and for students to enhance their professional development skills. The Program also offered four different diversity, equity, inclusion, and justice (DEIJ) trainings for all participants to deepen their knowledge of DEIJ and understand how to apply those principles to their professional careers. Three of these events were inperson, while 10 were remote.

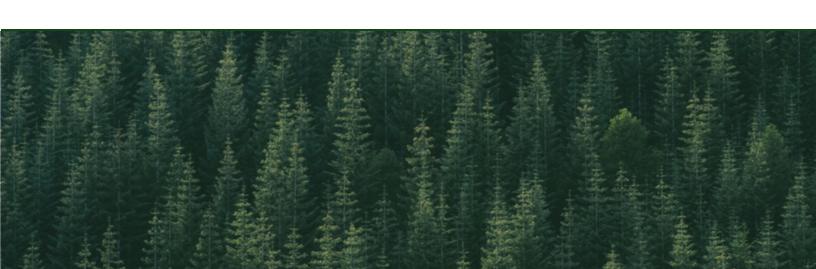

LOOKING FORWARD

As The Forestry and Natural Resources Career Mentorship Program continues to strive toward expansion of resources for students, a few big changes are coming in the 24-25 academic year.

Taking perspectives from the 23-24 end-of-year survey into account, the Program is working to develop more inperson networking and training opportunities, with a particular focus on hosting DEIJ workshops that are inperson and specifically geared toward forestry and natural resources, utilizing a new training facilitator versed in natural resources.

Additionally, as of June 2024, Program management has shifted from long-time lead Allison Erny to her Placer RCD colleague, Liana Vitousek. Allison has done a remarkable job of managing the program since its inception, and maintains an active role as the Program's Vice Chair heading into the 24-25 academic year. Liana's experience in natural resources, science communication, community engagement, and events coordination, paired with guidance from the Steering Committee, puts her in an excellent position to take on the tasks required of the Program Manager.

As the Program approaches the end of funding from CAL FIRE's Business and Workforce Development Grant, the incoming Chair, Program Manager, and Steering Committee will continue to utilize existing funding with care, while seeking new income streams to ensure the Program continues after grant expiration in March of 2026. The Program relies on volunteers and donations now more than ever.

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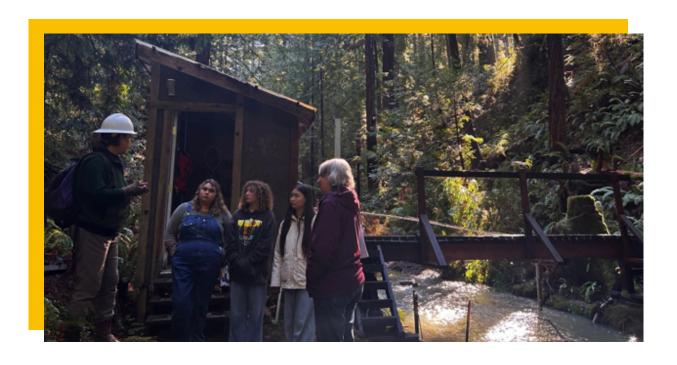
